

INFLUENZA WEEKLY UPDATE

2013/26: 24–30 June 2013

The national influenza surveillance system in New Zealand is an essential public health component for assessing and implementing strategies to control influenza. This report summarises the data collected from sentinel general practice (GP) surveillance and non-sentinel surveillance for week 26 (24–30 June 2013).

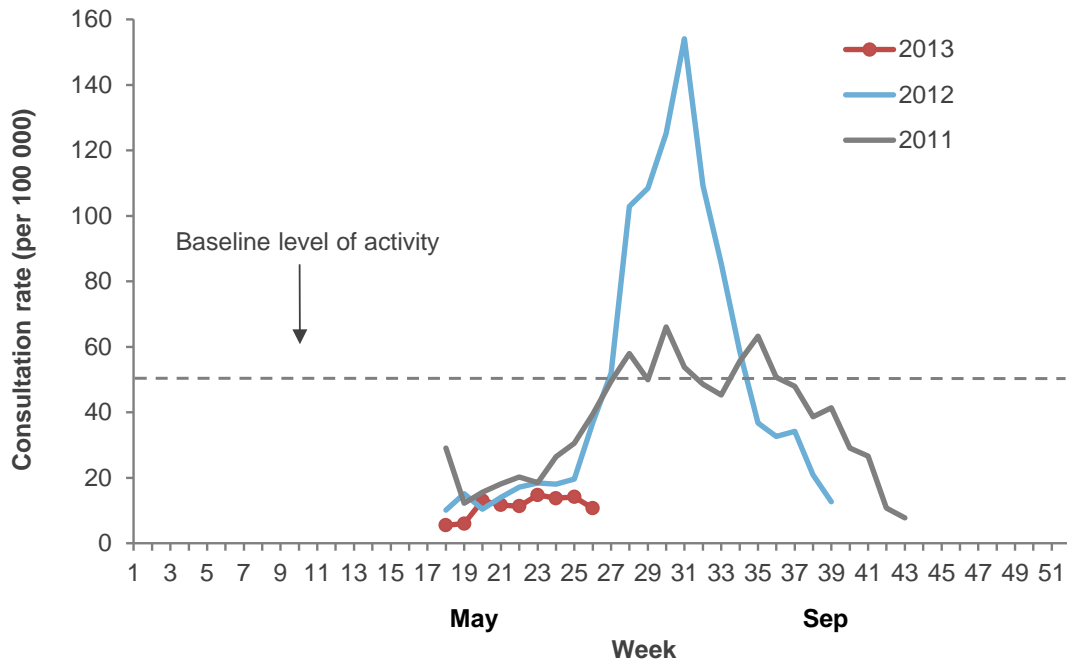
Summary

- ILI through sentinel surveillance was reported from 18 out of 20 District Health Boards (DHB) with a national consultation rate of 10.7 per 100 000 (41 ILI consultations).
- A total of 241 swabs were received from sentinel (21) and non-sentinel (220) surveillance.
- 21 influenza viruses were identified: B (lineage not determined) (14), A (not sub-typed) (5), and A(H3N2) (2).

INFLUENZA-LIKE ILLNESS SURVEILLANCE

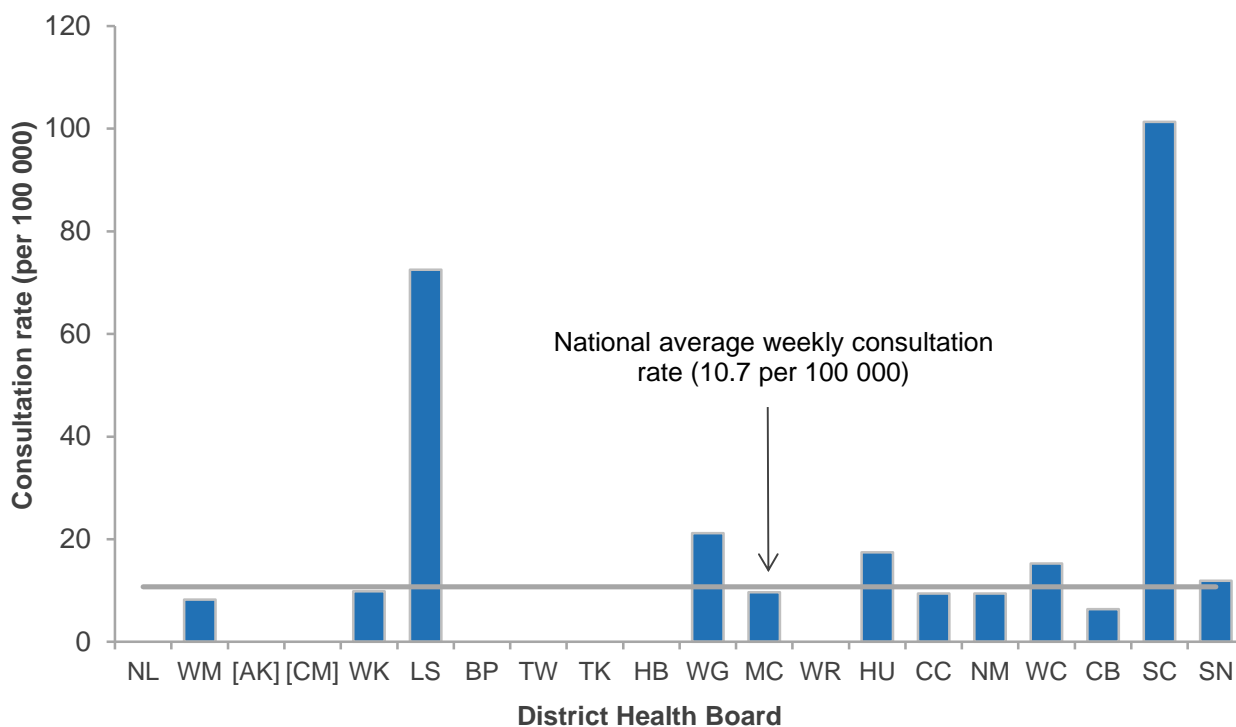
Figure 1. Weekly consultation rates for influenza-like illness in New Zealand, 2011, 2012 and 2013

In the past week, a total of 41 consultations for influenza-like illness were reported from 69 general practices in 18 out of 20 DHBs. This gives a weekly consultation rate of 10.7 per 100 000 patient population. Figure 1 shows the weekly national consultation rates for 2011, 2012 seasons, and 2013 so far. The current rate of influenza-like illness is below the baseline.

* A weekly rate <50 ILI consultations per 100 000 patient population is considered baseline activity. A rate of 50–249 is considered indicative of normal seasonal influenza activity, and a rate of 250–399 indicative of higher than expected influenza activity. A rate >400 ILI consultations per 100 000 patient population indicates an epidemic level of influenza activity.

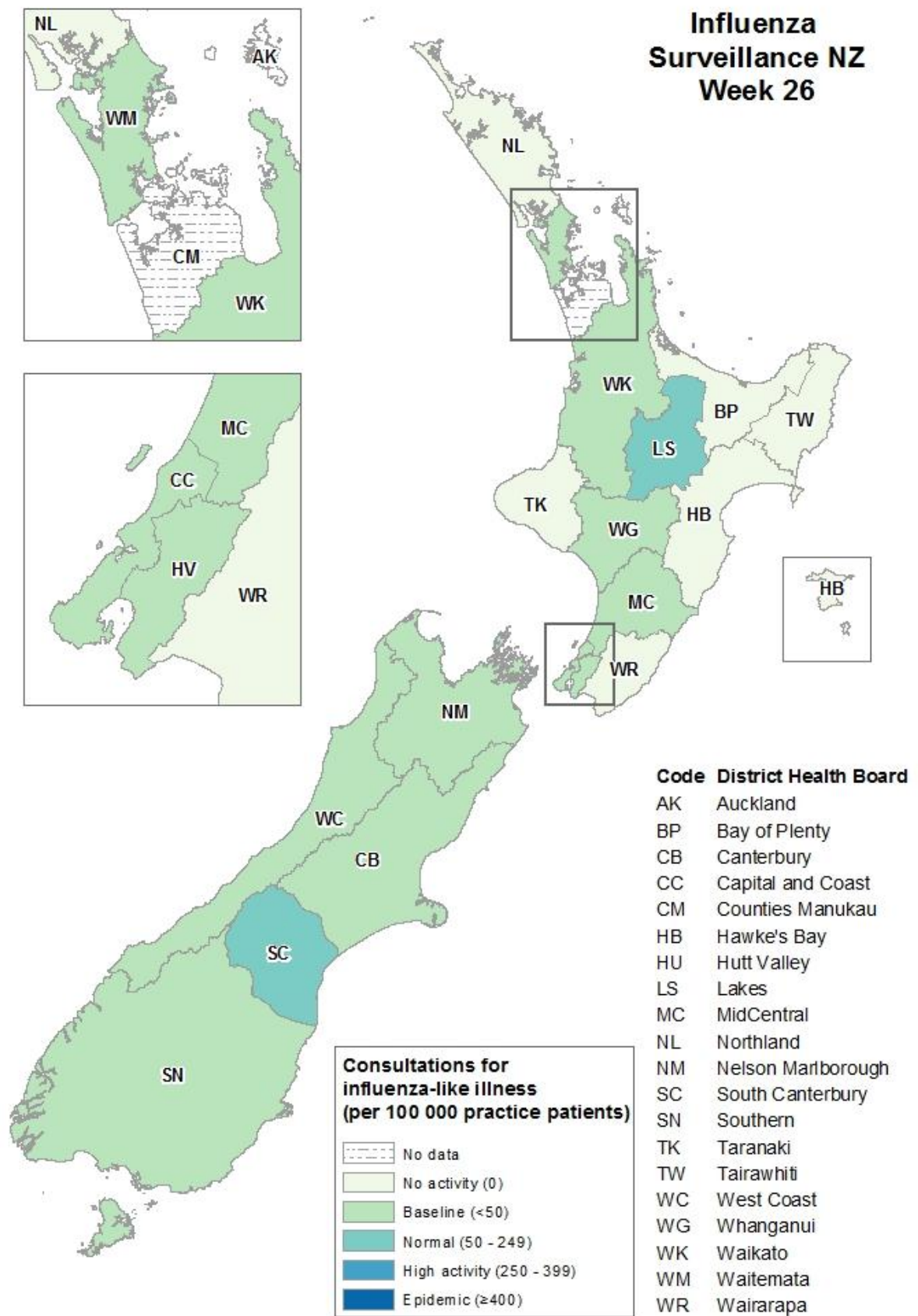
Figure 2. Weekly consultation rates for influenza-like illness by DHB week ending 30 June 2013

Figure 2 compares the consultation rates for influenza-like illness for each DHB over the past week. South Canterbury DHB had the highest consultation rate (101.3 per 100 000, 7 cases), followed by Lakes (72.6 per 100 000, 3 cases) and Whanganui (21.2 per 100 000, 1 case).

Note: Auckland (AK) and Counties Manukau (CM) DHBs follow the Southern Hemisphere Influenza and Vaccine Effectiveness Research and Surveillance (SHIVERS) case definition which is different from this sentinel surveillance. Based on the SHIVERS weekly report, the ILI incidence for Auckland and Counties Manukau DHBs for week 26 were 27.5 per 100 000 and 23.1 per 100 000 patient populations, respectively. VIROLOGICAL SURVEILLANCE

A total of 21 swabs were received by virology laboratories from sentinel surveillance. No viruses were identified.

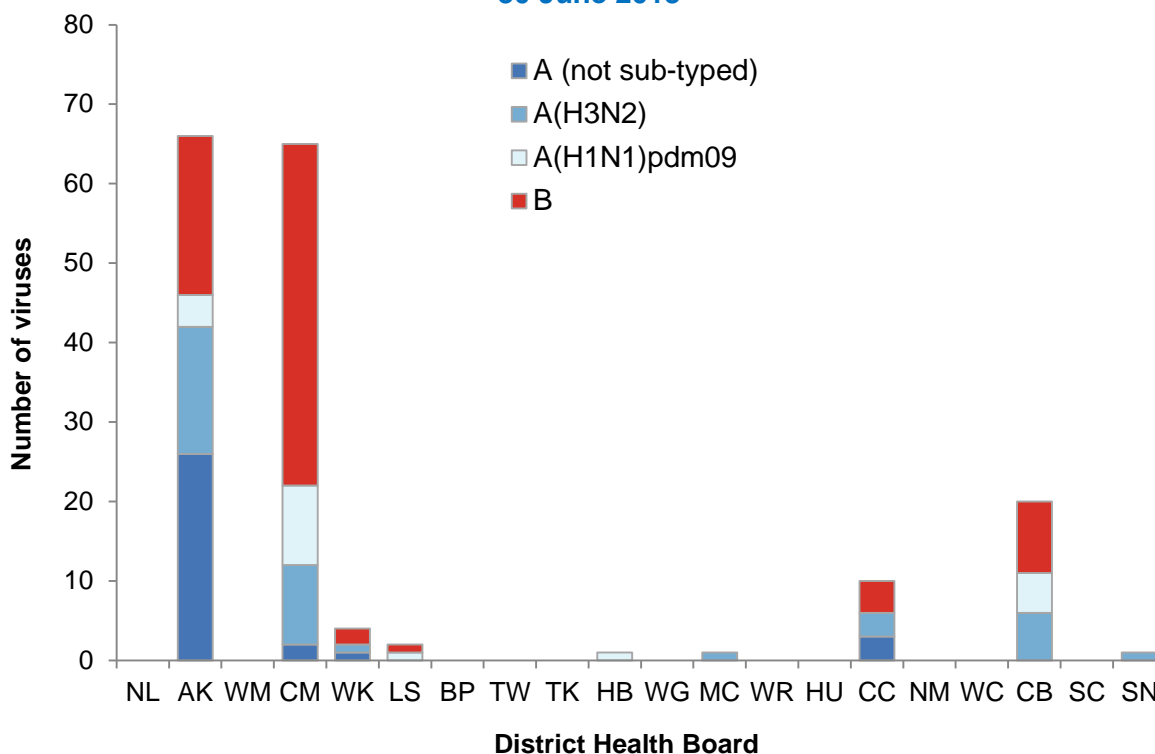
In addition, 220 swabs were received by virology laboratories from non-sentinel surveillance. Of these, 21 influenza viruses were identified: B (lineage not determined) (14), A (not sub-typed) (5), and A(H3N2) (2). The distribution by DHB is shown in Table 1.

Figure 4 shows the cumulative total of influenza viruses confirmed (sentinel and non-sentinel surveillance) from week 1 to the end of week 26 (30 June 2013). A total of 170 influenza viruses were identified: B (79) including six B/Wisconsin/1/2010-like viruses and three of B/Brisbane/60/2008-like, A (not sub-typed) (32), A(H3N2) (38) including one A/Victoria/361/2011 (H3N2)-like virus, and A(H1N1)pdm09 (21) including five A/California/7/2009 (H1N1)-like viruses.
